5:30 P.M.**

1. CALL TO ORDER: President Engle called the December 30, 2019, Regular Session to order at 5:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers, City Administration Building.

2. INVOCATION: Vice President Wallace provided the Invocation.

3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: President Michael Engle led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

4. ROLL CALL: Vice President Edgar Wallace, Councilman Will Urschel, Councilman Dale Louderback, Councilman Wesley Smith, Councilman Levi Dean, Mayor Sarah Mays, and President Michael Engle were present. Council-elects Cody Brannum, Rebekah Dean, and Thomas Scrivens were also present.

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Motion by Councilman Louderback, seconded by Councilman Smith, to approve the December 12, 2019, Regular Session meeting minutes as written. No discussion followed. The Roll on this was the following:

Motion by Mayor Mays, seconded by Councilman Smith, to approve the December 12, 2019, Special Session meeting minutes as written. No discussion followed. The Roll on this was the following:

Vice President Wallace explained that he abstained for the approval minutes due to his absence during the above-mentioned meetings.

6. SPECIAL PRESENTATION(S):

A. Proclamation for Outgoing Councilman Will Urschel. Mayor Mays read the proclamation on Councilman Urschel to acknowledge his one year of service as a Councilmember. (Applause followed.) Councilman Urschel said he was humbled by the Proclamation and thanked Mayor Mays for the reading.

B. Introduction of Resolution 2019-NN Appreciation for Outgoing Councilman Michael D. Engle in Recognition of his Valuable Service to the City of Xenia. Mayor Mays entertained introduction of the Resolution as written.

Vice President Wallace presented RESOLUTION 2019-NN APPRECIATION FOR OUTGOING COUNCILMAN MICHAEL D. ENGLE IN RECOGNITION OF HIS VALUABLE SERVICE TO THE CITY OF XENIA, and it was read for the first time.

C. Introduction of Resolution 2019-OO Appreciation for Outgoing Councilman Dale Louderback in Recognition of his Valuable Service to the City of Xenia. President Engle entertained introduction of the Resolution as written.

Mayor Mays presented RESOLUTION 2019-OO APPRECIATION FOR OUTGOING COUNCILMAN DALE LOUDERBACK IN RECOGNITION OF HIS VALUABLE SERVICE TO THE CITY OF XENIA, and it was read for the first time.

Vice President Wallace asked if the Resolutions would be read into the record. Mayor Mays said the Councilmembers being honored requested that the Resolutions not be read in their entirety and to present them by title only. She took a moment to recognize and thank President Engle and Councilman Louderback for their faithful service to this community. She said both gentlemen have been advocates for this community.

7. AUDIENCE COMMENTS: President Engle explained the procedures for audience comments and invited anyone who wished to speak to come forward.

Mark Jarvis, 715 Mt. Vernon Drive, thanked Councilman Louderback for his service to the community; he has worked very hard for the City of Xenia and has fought hard for the City and its tax payers.

8. OLD BUSINESS: None.

9. PUBLIC HEARINGS:

A. ORDINANCE 2019-25 AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF XENIA, OHIO, TO REZONE 65 S. PROGRESS DRIVE FROM PUD, PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT, TO B-1, CONVENIENCE BUSINESS DISTRICT, originally introduced by President Engle, and it was read for a second time. President Engle opened the public hearing at 5:40 p.m. asked those who wished to speak in favor of the rezoning to come forward.

Jerry Sharkey, 6270 N. St. Rt. 48, Lebanon, said he is a commercial real estate broker representing the property owner located at the corner of S. Progress Drive and Main Street. They are asking for the change to possibly add some retail at this location. There are no firm plans, but the rezoning would open up the property to other opportunities.

President Engle asked those who wished to speak against the rezoning to come forward. No one came forward. He then entertained additional comments from Council. None were presented. He closed the public hearing at 5:42 p.m.

Motion by President Engle, seconded by Vice President Wallace, to adopt Ordinance 2019-25 as written. Councilman Louderback said he works in the building located on this property and asked if he should abstain from the vote. Law Director Donnette Fisher said yes. The Roll on this was the following:

B. ORDINANCE 2019-26 AMENDING THE TIMBER RIDGE PUD BY ALLOWING A NURSING HOME ON 13.5 UNDEVELOPED ACRES, BY ALLOWING SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT ON 21.25 UNDEVELOPED ACRES AND EXISTING PLATTED LOTS, AND BY ADOPTING CERTAIN ADDITIONAL DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS, originally introduced by Councilman Urschel, and it was read for a second time. President Engle opened the public hearing at 5:43 p.m. and asked those who wished to speak in favor of the PUD Amendment to come forward.

Greg Miller, 12500 Reed Hartman Highway, Cincinnati, said he is the developer/operator for this project. He said they operate seven facilities in the Cincinnati area that are state of the art facilities. [With this project] They expect to create over 125 jobs with an expected payroll of \$4.5 million that would generate over \$100,000 in income tax revenue. The investment in Xenia would be over \$12 million for the project itself. When they come into a community, they want to become a part of the community, including becoming part of the Chamber of Commerce, investing in park projects, etc., and they want to be a good neighbor to all. They learned during the first reading of this ordinance that there was a concern with the number of EMS calls in Xenia and the concern that this facility would further tax the system. He said the facility they are proposing would be for short-term stays with a low re-hospitalization rate. He feels current facilities in Xenia are inappropriately utilizing EMS services. He noted those being served in the proposed facility would be a younger demographic who are having knee and/or hip replacements or other orthopedic surgeries who would stay a few weeks and then return home. They may have some who need to stay a bit longer. Regardless, they would be happy to discuss funding part of the EMS issue. In terms of the Timber Ridge neighborhood, he had spoken with many residents, and while they may not all be in agreement, he agreed to build a buffer for the lots that will back up to the proposed facility, and the streets would not be connected. He noted the land has been zoned for single-family homes but has sat vacant for almost 30 years. He further noted that Elmcroft said they send their residents to Fairborn and Beavercreek for care. He asked for the Ordinance to be approved with conditions or tabled so they can go back and work on an agreeable and positive solution.

President Engle asked those who wished to speak against the PUD Amendment to come forward.

Ron Taylor, 2461 Ridge Road, said he has been a resident of Timber Ridge for almost 30 years. He has been actively involved in the history of Timber Ridge and played a part in stopping the illegal mining done by the previous developer that occurred in the area. Over 20 years ago, he spoke in opposition to the request for an assisted living facility, which was denied by the City because Timber Ridge was always intended for single-family homes. When the Timber Ridge residents received a public hearing notice, they had no idea these plans were in the works. Many residents attended and spoke at the Planning and Zoning public hearing. He said the City Planner and Planning and Zoning Commission endorsed this project to move forward to City Council even though no comments were made regarding the EMS crisis at that time. Timber Ridge residents have reached out to the Mayor and Council members with their concerns. Beyond the EMS issue, he asked Council members to remember that Timber Ridge was zoned for single-family homes. They purchased their lots and built their homes based on that commitment. A 95,000 square foot nursing home the size of Home Depot was not part of the intended development.

Howard Horstman, 2428 Ridge Road, said he has lived in the Timber Ridge neighborhood for about 10 years. He said there is a perception that there was no interest in developing single-family homes in this area and the developer believes that “no activity” indicates no market for new single-family homes. He recently retired and has spent more time at home, and he has seen a considerable

increase in traffic in the neighborhood when a house or lot goes up for sale. He believes some residents purchased adjacent vacant lots to keep green space around their homes or they were purchased by those in anticipation of building a home for their retirement years. He urged Council to encourage development that follows the existing PUD.

Alyssa Varvel, 2495 Ridge Road, said she just moved to the neighborhood four months ago, and she and her family are part of the traffic that has visited the neighborhood and waited for the opportunity to buy a home there. They wanted this neighborhood versus other neighborhoods in Xenia because of the spacious lots, and they would not have bought this home if they knew a nursing home was going to be built. Future lots would be harder to sell because she did not believe people would want a nursing home in their back yards. She urged Council to keep the current PUD so more homes can be built instead of those people choosing Bellbrook or Beavercreek. If the PUD amendment is approved, she asked how they would be certain that the remaining land would not be changed to allow other types of non-residential development, such as a convenience store or another medical office building. The nursing homes in Xenia have low ratings because they are not staffed, which can be changed. She and her family were at the YMCA when the gentleman drowned, and they called 9-1-1. It took nine minutes for them to respond from the Fire Station on Second Street. That's a problem, and this project will only make it worse. She asked Council to keep all this in mind as they make their decision.

Kurt Sanders, 2485 Ridge Road, said the Planning and Zoning Commission did a good job in reviewing this proposed project; however, he was concerned that if approved, the developer would eventually want to expand the facility. He was surprised no other existing lots in Xenia were being considered for this project. He asked Council to reject this Ordinance or table it for the developer to work on the proposal.

President Engle asked Councilman Urschel if he wished to move forward on this for a vote. Councilman Urschel said he did.

Motion by Councilman Urschel to adopt Ordinance 2019-26 as written. President Engle asked if there was a second to the motion.

Vice President Wallace asked for a motion to table so a resolution could be reached between the neighborhood residents and the developer. He would personally love to see this development in Xenia, noting it would be located next to an existing care facility.

Councilman Louderback said the EMS issue is too serious. The developer projects 60 calls but neighboring Elmcroft has called 169 times so far this year—the City cannot handle another facility. He said 125 jobs would be nice but he wondered if they would be good paying jobs. The bottom line is this: It would only be about \$21,000 to the City if they build the 30 additional homes. He would like to vote on this issue tonight, and he seconded Councilman Urschel's motion. President Engle said two motions were presented—one to vote for/against and one to table—and asked the Law Director for her opinion on how to proceed. Ms. Fisher said the motion to table is a subsidiary motion and takes precedence over the main question. Therefore, the motion to table needs to be handled first.

Motion by Vice President Wallace, seconded by President Engle, to table Ordinance 2019-26. Discussion followed.

Councilman Louderback said no developer in the State of Ohio can take care of the EMS problem and asked Assistant City Manager Jared Holloway for his opinion. Mr. Holloway said the City of Xenia has the second highest call volume in Greene County. The call volume has been growing each year by 5% since 1988, which is unsustainable growth and abuse. Emergency medical services cost the City millions of dollars each year. Councilman Louderback said Council and staff have been working on the EMS issue for over a year; Xenia is the County seat and the problem will not go away. He asked Mr. Holloway if he supports the project. Mr. Holloway said with the current EMS issues, he recognized they need to determine how to address that issue with this project. Councilman Urschel said 20% of the total EMS call volume is being utilized by the assisted living and nursing homes in Xenia, which equates to less than 1% of Xenia residents. They are at the point where 90% to 95% of the current call volume is for EMS transports. As the call volume continues to increase every year, they will need to increase Fire Division staffing and the number of emergency vehicles accordingly, which costs a lot of money. Council voted to make some changes to EMS billing policies, and they will have to wait and see the effectiveness of those changes. He feels quality care is needed in Xenia and they need to look at this proposal further, but they need to take their time to determine how this facility stacks up with current ones in addition to where it should be located. For any substantial change over what was initially recommended, he suggested that the developer start with the City Manager's Office and work with community members to address all issues before presenting it again to the Planning and Zoning Commission and eventually City Council.

Ms. Fisher said an "aye" vote was a vote to approve Ordinance 2019-26 for the PUD amendment and a "nay" vote was a vote against the PUD amendment as written.

10. NEW BUSINESS:

A. ORDINANCE 2019-27 AMENDING ORDINANCE 2019-24 TO PROVIDE APPROPRIATIONS FOR CURRENT EXPENSES AND OTHER EXPENDITURES FOR THE CITY OF XENIA, OHIO, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2019, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. Finance Director Ryan Duke said at the end of every year, Council is asked to pass an emergency appropriation ordinance to allow staff to make transfers to have funds available for final personnel, operating, and capital costs including insurance costs that have to be paid up front and reimbursed at a later date by the stop loss carrier.

President Engle entertained a motion for passage of Ordinance 2019-27 as presented.

Motion by Vice President Wallace, seconded by Councilman Smith to adopt Ordinance 2019-27 as presented. No discussion followed. The Roll on this was the following:

B. ORDINANCE 2019-28 PROVIDING TEMPORARY APPROPRIATIONS FOR CURRENT EXPENSES AND OTHER EXPENDITURES FOR THE CITY OF XENIA, OHIO, THROUGH MARCH 31, 2020, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. Mr. Holloway

respectfully requested that Council adopt an emergency interim appropriation ordinance to be effective January 1, 2020, for the continuation of municipal operations at the start of the New Year and to ensure the City meets applicable statutory requirements. Per the staff report, the ordinance is derived from the proposed 2020 budget, as updated in December 2019 (originally submitted to Council in October 2019). For a variety of reasons, it is extremely difficult to pass a final budget before first closing out the prior year's books. It is, however, necessary for Council to take action approving temporary funding for the ensuing fiscal year operations to ensure continuity of services. This emergency ordinance will allow staff to continue operating until the final appropriation ordinance can be passed by City Council. Adoption of this temporary appropriation ordinance does not constitute approval of the final budget and does not include the final encumbrances for the year, which will not be known until after December 31, 2019. Additionally, there is a Charter requirement for the City to conduct a public hearing before the adoption of the final budget. Once all necessary budget review and public hearings have been completed, staff will schedule with Council the final budget public hearing and will then present a recommended final appropriation ordinance for Council's approval. The final budget must be completed no later than April 1, 2019, but it is staff's intention to bring a final budget to Council for approval in January 2020.

President Engle entertained a motion for passage of Ordinance 2019-28 as presented.

Motion by Councilman Dean, seconded by Mayor Mays, to adopt Ordinance 2019-28 as presented. No discussion followed. The Roll on this was the following:

C. ORDINANCE 2019-29 AMENDING ORDINANCE 2019-18 TO ALTER THE SCHEDULE OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS PREVIOUSLY LEVIED FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING, AND IMPROVING CERTAIN PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS IN THE CITY OF XENIA, OHIO, IN COOPERATION WITH THE XENIA ENERGY SPECIAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. Mr. Duke said in August 2019, Council passed legislation creating an Energy Special Improvement District (ESID) and levied assessments for a project to be completed at 136 W. Second Street. Since the passage of the legislation, the property owner has encountered some obstacles related to financing of the project. As the parties work to resolve this issue and find a viable way to move the project forward, a request has been made to push back the assessment schedule by one year. In order to request a removal of the assessment from the 2020 tax bill, an amendment of the ordinance levying the assessments must happen immediately. On behalf of the property owner, he respectfully requested that Council pass an amendment to the original ordinance delaying the implementation of the assessments for the project.

President Engle entertained a motion for passage of Ordinance 2019-29 as presented.

Motion by Councilman Urschel, seconded by Vice President Wallace, to adopt Ordinance 2019-29 as presented. Brief discussion followed.

Councilman Urschel said ESIDs allow commercial entities a novel way to finance energy improvements (windows, HVAC, insulation, etc.) and would be a great boon to this community. He discussed ESIDs with the group of downtown business representatives who attended the special session on December 12, and they are very interested in them. He recognized there will be some starts and stops as they navigate through the first ESID project.

D. Administrative Motion Awarding the Bid and Authorizing the City Manager to Execute a Contract with Kelchner, Inc., for the Innovation Drive Water and Sewer Installation Project. Mr. Holloway said at Council's meeting on November 14, 2019, the City Manager was authorized to execute an Infrastructure Development Agreement (IDA) with the Greene County Career Center (GCCC) Board of Education to define the responsibilities of both parties for the construction of infrastructure improvements on the GCCC site. Because of the urgency to have water and sewer service available to the site by April 1, 2020, City staff opted to bid this work separate from the construction of roadway extension from Union Road to U.S. 68, which is expected to occur during the first quarter of 2020. On December 18, 2019, ten (10) bids were received from qualified contractors to complete the installation of the water and sewer mains. The bids received are summarized in the agenda report with Kelchner, Inc., submitting the lowest and best bid at \$516,655.55. Engineering staff is confident in Kelchner's ability to successfully complete this project because this firm is intimately familiar with the site and it has completed numerous similar projects over many years and recommends awarding the bid to Kelchner, Inc.

President Engle entertained a motion.

Motion by Mayor Mays, seconded by Vice President Wallace, to award the bid for the Innovation Drive Water and Sewer Installation project and authorize the City Manager to execute a contract with Kelchner, Inc., to complete the project at a cost not-to-exceed \$516,655.55. No discussion followed. The Roll on this was the following:

E. Administrative Motion Appointing a Volunteer to Fill a Vacancy on the Board for Recreation, Arts, and Cultural Activities. President Engle said a member of the Board for Recreation, Arts, and Cultural Activities (BRACA), whose term was due to expire on July 31, 2020, rendered her resignation effective December 31, 2019. Outgoing Councilman Will Urschel has expressed an interest in filling this vacancy. Mr. Urschel has volunteered at several BRACA functions including the annual Easter Egg Hunt held at Shawnee Park, which is co-sponsored by his church, Emmanuel Baptist Church. This short-term appointment will give Mr. Urschel an opportunity to determine if he wishes to serve a full four-year term. If so, re-appointment by Council will be requested at that time.

President Engle entertained a motion.

Motion by Vice President Wallace, seconded by President Engle, to appoint Mr. Will Urschel to fill a vacancy on the Board for Recreation, Arts, and Cultural Activities with a term expiration date of July 31, 2020. No discussion followed. The Roll on this was the following:

Councilman Urschel thanked Councilman Louderback and President Engle. If it had not been for Councilman Louderback, he would have never thought about becoming a council member. He learned that partnership can happen between the faith community and the municipality. He said Councilman Louderback has a heart for the citizens of Xenia. He presented Councilman Louderback with a gift. Councilman Louderback thanked him for the gift. Councilman Urschel said President Engle has another side to him that not many know ... he does not just serve the City—he serves this nation. He shared a story about losing 23,000 aircraft and 56,000 Airmen in combat operations in World War II, and thankfully, the United States prevailed because when “you don’t have air superiority, you don’t have ground superiority.” In the Korean War, 3,000 aircraft were lost. Again, the United States still prevailed due to the quantity of aircraft. In Vietnam, an additional 3,000 aircraft were lost. They had quantity but not technology. After Vietnam, something changed, which was intelligence, and in the 1970s, things were looked at differently when the development people started working with the intelligence people in a group called the Air Intelligence Center. He reported that the United States has been in constant combat operations since 1991 and the first Gulf War. Since 1999—three decades—not one aircraft has been lost in an air-to-air engagement. Since 2003, not one aircraft has been lost in a surface-to-air engagement. And that is because the folks in intelligence core have been collecting that information and passing that over to the design folks. He worked for 34 years on aircraft design. He was there at the genesis of all the stealth aircraft and reconnaissance aircraft, etc. He remembers going from his design side to the (now called) National Air Intelligence Center, and many times the person he saw was President Engle, who gave him and his team the information they needed to properly design the aircraft in a way that it would not be lost so the United States Air Force could maintain air superiority and not put Airmen in harm’s way. He said President Engle is a national asset to this country, and it has been honor to have somebody like him serving in such an incredibly important position that impacts hundreds of lives and hundreds of aircraft, not to mention the billions of dollars at stake. He thanked him for his service for his “day” job as well as his service to this community. He presented President Engle with a very special gift—a chunk of the Berlin Wall—which was very significant to each of them. He has personally been a part of many high-powered teams with his defense work where they get to handpick all members including financial folks, program managers, and workers, and Xenia’s staff stacks up to any of the high-powered teams he has operated with in the last 35 years. He has been very impressed by the quality of City staff and their dedication; he thanked them all for their hard work.

Councilman Dean said he appreciated all the outgoing council members. He appreciated Councilman Louderback for showing the heart and guts to go against the grain even though it was not popular. Councilman Urschel came onto Council and learned really fast, and he appreciated his service. He appreciated President Engle for his time as President, even though they may not have always agreed, President Engle gave everyone a fair shake and let them speak their minds.

Vice President Wallace said at first, he did not think he was going to get along with Councilman Louderback, but he met his wife in town. When he found out how wonderful she was, he figured he should give Councilman Louderback a chance. He appreciates Councilman Louderback for everything he has done and all he has learned from him, he appreciates Councilman Urschel for his willingness to learn so quickly, and he appreciates President Engle for all of his service as Councilman Urschel so eloquently shared. He wished them all the best.
